

President's REPORT

The pantry is now back to pre-COVID operations. We are once again allowing clients



inside the building and allowing them to do modified shopping. While the Country Store is not as fully stocked with fresh

produce as it once was, we are still allowing clients to have some flexibility in choosing what they want. We are still allowing clients to visit the pantry twice each month but are not yet ready to do client eligibility interviews. We are checking addresses to ensure that clients are Henrico residents from driver's licenses and recent bills with their current address. Client interviews may resume later this year.

We are still maintaining our current management style. This smooth operation continues to be due to the current management model: Client Relations/Registrations, Warehouse Operations, and Administrative Management. The pantry is operating smoothly and efficiently and, thanks to our many donors, the warehouse shelves are full.

By December 31st, the pantry will have served several thousand clients representing nearly 5,000 households in Henrico. Not as many as in years past but the numbers are growing once again. Based on the 2017 population statistics in Henrico, our total clients served represent 5.5% of the total county population.

The warehouse operates at top efficiency

due to the efforts of Judy Pierce (see article later) and her team of volunteers. Judy oversees the warehouse, ensuring that jobs are



completed not only in food storage, distribution, and safety, but also in maintaining a clean and safe workplace.

It has mind-altering effects if taken in large doses.




Crackers have holes in them for a reason.

Volunteers will perform pick-up and stocking duties if they deem it safe for travel. Drivers should notify stores if they do not plan to make the pick-up. Maybe you can't make a monetary or food donation to LAMB's Basket just now, but you can collect and donate



paper grocery bags (with handles). We double bag due to the



weight of canned goods and a tendency for handles to break. You can imagine how many of those bags are used each week. Also produce and meat are placed in plastic bags. We rely on donated bags, so don't throw them away, but recycle them by donating them to the pantry.

WHAT YOU CAN DO.

Warehouse

- Double up bags
- Unpack boxes and put groceries on marked shelves
- Sort produce
- Bag prepackaged meats
- Sort and bag bread & desserts



Front Room Runner


- Hand out numbers to clients as they enter.
- Take sticky notes from the front office to the 'Country Store' and Distribution Area, placing them in order on the door facing.

"Country Store"

- Assist clients in collecting the appropriate amount of produce, desserts, and meats
- Keep the shelves stocked

Distribution Area


Place a grocery and bread bag in the 'cubby' beneath the client's name (on a sticky note) according



to the number of family members indicated.

 Give clients appropriate bags when they come out of the 'Country Store'.

Food Pick-Ups (You don't always need a truck.)



 Be a substitute pick-up person who can be called upon when someone is on vacation or ill.
